Summary of Primary Sport Premium 2020-21	
<u>Key Achievements to date until July 2020 (due to COVID-19 Lockdown)</u> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Throughout lockdown we maintained a physical curriculum for children using remote learning opportunities. Children in school took part in physical daily exercise.2. Sports Partnership Teacher in school prior to lockdown (Steph Alderslade) and attended school sports festivals and after school and breakfast sports club.3. Commando Joe training took place and then in school training on the planning units of work were disseminated, regarding the RESPECT curriculum.4. New PE kit for children (Red crew neck t shirts and hoody) to ensure everyone was dressed appropriately for sporting activities in all weathers and to instill a sense of team spirit when taking place in festivals and tournaments within the locality.	

5. Staff have shadowed and team taught with the coaches for each sport. An assessment tool has been developed and implemented across school.

Objectives for 2020-21

1. To continue to provide children with Physical Education during potential future lockdowns and bubble isolation due to ongoing pandemic
2. To improve the provision and quality of PE & school sport in lessons and develop young leaders at playtime, encouraging a minimum of 30 minutes of active play
3. To ensure that the amount of intra and inter festivals is sustained, when restrictions allow
4. To develop children as sports people, with a particular focus on resilience and teamwork
5. To continue to ensure all members of staff are upskilled to effectively deliver the PE curriculum and enrichment opportunities
