


Autumn 1 2024

Early Years Newsletter



Theme:Outside/Inside

A very warm welcome to our Nursery and Reception children! We hope you have enjoyed the Summer break and you are all excited for the term ahead. This newsletter will outline our topics, including the learning and objectives, for the Autumn 1.

Personal, Social and Emotional **Development**

We will be exploring emotions through the use of colours, the Zones of Regulation framework, and the delightful story of the 'Colour Monster' which offers our children an engaging and insightful way to develop their understanding of feelings. Through activities centred around listening and helping friends, tidying up, and following instructions, children not only enhance their social and emotional skills but also cultivates a sense of responsibility and cooperation within the classroom community.

Communication and Language

We will be enjoying and engaging with lots of different stories and non-fiction books during storytimes and within our class reading area. The children will be encouraged to listen carefully to rhymes, songs and learn new vocabulary. We will participate in discussions during our circle time and present during sharing times. Through modelling and support, we will be learning to articulate and connect ideas and thoughts to develop our speaking skills.

During our structured PE sessions we will be moving in a range of ways throughout activities and games to develop our agility, balance and coordination. We will also have lots of opportunities in our outdoor provision to advance our gross motor skills. To develop our fine motor skills, we will engage in morning challenge 'funky finger' activities, have access to a range of one-handed tools and with adult guidance and support begin to develop a comfortable grip when drawing and writing.

Expressive Arts and Design During our art and design sessions, we will be focusing on self-portraits and printing. In printing, the children will look at the work of famous print artists such as Yayoi Kusama, then they will be experimenting with printing fruit and animals.
